### Pupil Premium Report to Parents September 2014

#### Overview

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and paid by means of a specific grant based on school census figures for pupils registered as eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) in reception to Year 11. For children looked after (by the Local Authority) the Pupil Premium was calculated using the Children Looked After data returns (SSDA903). A premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. This service premium is designed to address the emotional and social well-being of these pupils.

The Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding and it will be used by this school to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible by ensuring that funding reaches the pupils who need it most.

### Objectives for Pupil Premium in this School

- 1. We will use the Pupil Premium to provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils.
- 2. We will use the funding to narrow and close the gap between the achievement of these pupils and their peers.
- 3. As far as our powers allow we will use the additional funding to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupils Premium and others.
- 4. We will ensure that the additional funding reaches the pupils who need it most and that it makes a significant impact on their education and lives.

#### School Policy

The Headteacher and governing body have agreed a policy for Pupil Premium to guide the use of funds and to ensure that it represents value for money.

### Accountability

The headteacher and leadership team will regularly and rigorously monitor, evaluate and review the strategies we have put into place for Pupil Premium and report to the governing body on its progress and impact.

The governors' curriculum and finance committees will in turn regularly and rigorously scrutinise the impact of our pupil premium spend to ensure that it is being put to best use.
